

Dear Pastor(s)/Church Board,

Many years ago, the Lord impressed upon us the importance of discipling our children and raising them up to serve Him. In the last few years, our nation has seen a spiraling decline in public morality. Research shows that an estimated 70% of Christian youth stop attending church when they graduate from high school. This is clear evidence that we are losing the next generation, but your church has a wonderful opportunity to help reverse this trend and partner with families to provide the support needed to truly "train up a child" in the way he or she should go.
